<u>HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLOR`S REPORT – CLLR. ROGER PHILLIPS</u>

Following lobbying by the council and our two MPs the Government has awarded a grant of 1.76 million pounds to support work on Local Nutrient Mitigation to allow the development of housing in the Lugg catchment area – this of course includes the River Arrow. It is four and half years since a ban on the granting of new houses was brought in by Herefordshire Council acting on the directions of Natural England.

The Government announced its provisional settlement to local authorities on 18th December for their revenue accounts and with a 4.99% Council Tax increase (including the social care charge of 3%) the council is proposing a balanced budget for 2024/25. There are national and local concerns about the rising costs of Adult and Children's care services, home to school transport and special educational needs.

The Council has been carrying out a consultation on future fortnightly collection of garden waste from properties from March to October using a 240 litre brown bin. There would be a cost of £55 per annum with the garden waste being composted. Details can be found

Last month the council voted and supported by a majority the Capital Programme of the minority administration. It includes 10.6 million pounds for highway resurfacing, another 10 million to re-establish the building of the southern link road south of the city (from A465 Belmont to A49 at Grafton). Previous funds were received from government for this road, plus planning permission granted and some land compulsory purchased but the previous administration cancelled it and sold the land back.

The relocation of the library and learning centre to the Shirehall, the be funded with a further 3 million to reopen and make the building operational again. Also, jointly working with Hereford hospital and the H&W Group Training, to build and open an education facility to train local people for careers in the Health and Care sector.

There is also provision to invest in Employment land and incubation space at the market towns.

Last year allowed us to host and be a large part in the Coronation celebrations which offered a very successful village "bring your own lunch event" and a much-awaited repeat of the famous Eardisland raft race, both hugely enjoyed by many parishioners and with numerous requests to repeat again in 2024. We are hoping to repeat this in May this year.

The Village Hall Committee has managed with the support of our great community to raise sufficient funds for improvements to the hall. We have purchased a wide screen and projector to host film nights, the first being in February. We hope to repaint the hall and organise a number of further upgrades during this year.

We are open to all suggestions for future events for all ages and requirements in the village. If you have a request, please put it forward to a member of the committee. Please complete our questionnaire (see following pages) to aid us in improving the events and services offered. Alternatively come along to our open AGM and be part of the team.

FLOODS


One of the most useful resources in times of heavy rain, which happens mostly but not always in the winter months, is this website:

https://check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk/station/2195

The website connects with the river level monitor, which is situated on the grass on the shop side of the main bridge in the village. It gives real-time height levels.

Of more interest, if you think you are likely to flood, is what is happening further upstream on the Arrow – the next station up is Titley. Water there will reach us around six hours later (this varies according to conditions). In the January 2024 floods, the maximum reading was 2.24m at Titley, whilst the 'normal' height there is regarded as 1m. Once a surge starts at Titley, it is inevitable that it will end up here. The website has the ability to give you the Titley height graph (click 'upstream'). So, if your house is in danger of flooding, check the website. It may not be good news, but it will give time to move valuables and anything of value. By this stage, you should have done this anyway!



TREE PLANTING

CHRISTMAS TREES

The E&SG were pleased to see the Parish Council use locally grown real trees for the village display. It's hoped this can be expanded for next Christmas, perhaps to include having trees delivered to the village for use inside houses. Plastic trees have seven times the carbon footprint of real trees, so this is the environmentally friendly option and helps support the local economy. Having trees picked up and recycled adds to the sustainability and saves on parishioners having to drive to the recycling centre.

EARDISLAND MEMORIAL WALKS

Walk 3 commemorates Pte Stanley Hughes; born in Luston in 1897. He grew up at Little Broome Cottage, we assume part of the eponymous Farm. Close to the outbreak of war, records show that Stanley joined the Royal Horse Artillery in Woolwich, London, and later transferred to the 2nd Battalion (Princess Victoria's) Royal Irish Fusiliers

Stanley's Regiment fought in the Balkan Theatre, remembered more readerly as the 'Salonika Front'. Weather conditions led to health risks and, especially in summer, malaria became a scourge.

Stanley Hughes was wounded in battle and evacuated to a military hospital, where malaria took hold. Stanley was one of a huge number who died

of the disease in the summer of 1917.

He lies nearby, in Lahana Military Cemetery, Greece.

Stanley's commemorative walk leads up Broome Lane to Twyford, then over to Arrow Bridge in Pembridge. It takes you back to our War Memorial over fields following the line of the river, walking (or running!) in places on good paths through crops; and otherwise attractive meadows. Five miles in length, with no hills to climb and the Right of Way properly marked, Stanley's is the most popular of the Memorial Walks.

Please take care as you approach Eardisland and encounter a gate donated by our Dovecote Community Shop. The water underneath can cover your boots throughout the year and the bottom

surface is uneven. Beware of any protruding barbed wire on the large round post shown in front of the gate's standing post.

For your interest, there are complications relating to responsibilities for

fixing arguable defects on paths, gates, and stiles. This (picture) shows an example, and the Parish Council is fully aware of the situation. With the upcoming engagement of a Parish Footpath Officer working alongside both our Parish Council and the PROW department in Herefordshire Council, things can only get better! Please pass on the details of anything which appears likely to impede or present risks on our Rights of Way to the Parish Council. Also, please copy in contact@eardislandmemorialwalks.org.uk . A quick fix could be possible.



The majority of Eardisland Memorial Walks are in good/reasonable order. They can never reach the standard of memorials in military cemeteries, but being tidy and safe enough to support the sentiment of recognising the personal sacrifice of our Fallen seems to be appropriate.

In Herefordshire, the Highways Authority is responsible for ensuring the integrity of all Public Rights of Way, including Bridleways and Footpaths. The County struggles to maintain standards which meet statutory requirements. Times are tough, and helping the system work by identifying defects and risks is valuable.

Countryside walking is recognised as valuable in creating wealth, as well as improving health. Buy a brochure guide from the shop or pubs. Comments please to the website above.

VOTING

It is likely, but not certain, that there will be a general election during 2024 (it could be very early 2025). In a democracy, it is an important social responsibility to vote if eligible, and I urge you to do so. Whilst national politicians are not held in high esteem at the moment, if ever, it has to be said that their decisions will affect all our lives.

If you have registered for a postal vote, the necessary voting forms will be sent to you in time to vote when the election date is announced automatically. If you vote in person, you will need photo ID. There is a long list of acceptable photo ID formats. In most cases, this will be a driving licence or passport. Bus passes are acceptable for old age concessionaires. However, this is not true for younger people (I can't think why).

Importantly, if you don't have acceptable photo ID, Herefordshire Council is legally obliged to supply you with satisfactory verification if you are registered to vote. Contact the Council.

Please do consider this, because it would be very unfortunate if you wish to vote, but are turned away because you do not have the appropriate photo ID.

TREES AND HEDGES

There is still plenty of time left to plant bare root trees, shrubs and hedging – up to the end of March or even into April depending on the weather. We are lucky in having an excellent tree nursery nearby whose whips are very cheap and of very good quality. They are dug up on the morning of collection and are wrapped carefully so that the roots don't dry out. Once home they can either be planted straight away or will keep quite happily for several weeks if the roots are loosely covered with damp soil.

The Nursery is Bucknell Nurseries, approximately 20 minutes from Eardisland. Location and phone number are online but, unfortunately, they don't have an online catalogue. If you would like a catalogue, please give me a call – I will bring a few back when I next visit.

Example prices are 50p each for 2-3 ft hawthorn whips, or 38p each if 100 or more are ordered. Most other native species are between 50p and 80p each. Large whips are not necessary as shorter ones establish more successfully and usually soon catch up with any bigger ones planted. For hedging each whip will need a cane and spiral and each tree a stake and tube. I take all these off our trees and hedging once they are big enough not to need them and would be pleased if anyone could reuse them. They are several years old, but I have only saved the ones in reasonable condition.

Alternatively, Bucknell can supply everything you need. They also plant the trees or hedging for you for a very reasonable charge so long as you have enough to make it worth one of them travelling. One person can plant hundreds of hedging whips in half a day.

If you would like any advice or help getting started, please give me a call. If you only have space for a few shrubs or small trees, my recommendations are Guelder Rose, Rowan, Wayfaring Tree and Spindle as they have lovely blossom for bees in spring and berries for birds in winter. Our patch will have all of these in blossom soon as well as wild cherry, bird cherry, hawthorn, blackthorn, buckthorn, crab apple, wild pear and others. If you would like to visit, please get in touch.

Most hedgerow plants blossom on second year wood. This is why cutting hedges in rotation every 2-3 years increases the flower abundance when compared with annual cutting which often leads to little or no blossom. Cutting hedges incrementally wider and taller also leads to a greater abundance of second year wood and a greater availability of blossom and hence of berries and also provides better cover for hedge nesting birds.

I will put some copies of the Woodland Trust booklet "Twigged" in the village shop as well as a few other booklets on trees and wildlife. Please help yourself. Twigged is a small guide to trees with lovely photos of each tree including blossom, catkins, berries etc. The Woodland Trust's website has a similar A-Z of native British trees with many more tree species and with more information on each. The Tree Council website is also full of useful information, especially on the planting and care of trees.

EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT



The weather in Eardisland for November continued with the wet weather theme mainly due to storms Ciaran on the 2nd and Debi on the 13th. The total rainfall for the month was 106mm (4.17 inches). Temperatures ranged from 5°C to 14°C, with barometer pressures of 28.4 to 30.00. River levels were recorded from 18 inches to 48 inches.

For December, we saw even more named storms, Elin on the 9th, Fergus on the 10th and Gerrit on the 27th. This added to a

total rainfall for the month of 150mm (5.91inches). Temperatures ranged from minus 5°C to 12°C with barometer pressures of 28.94 to 30.26 recorded. As expected, river levels rose from 18 to 60 inches.

The total rainfall recorded for the year 2022 was 865mm (34.08 inches) and for this year 2023 was 995mm (39.2 inches).

Up-to-date figures for January 2024 show storm Henk on the 1st and 2nd bringing with it 38mm (1.49 inches) of rain, on top of December's heavy rainfall this caused the river level to rise to a level of 65 inches, my highest recorded to date.

Wishing everybody a happy and drier 2024.

IT WAS 20 YEARS AGO TODAY . . .

Edition 81, extract below, was printed by Oldlands Press run by Andrew Rixon, who lived in the converted barn next to the Court House. The magazine was previously printed by Weobley Comprehensive School, using an old Roneo printer. The then new Head decided not to continue the arrangement and we were desperate for a printer. Andrew stepped into the breach. When he moved out of the village, we transferred the printing to Leominster Community Resource Centre using a similar process. It is only relatively recently that technology has enabled the quality of printing that we enjoy today. How times have changed! Note that I used Times New Roman as the font in those days, which now looks very old-fashioned.

CORRESPONDENCE


I was interested in your article in the September issue regarding Queen Mary's visit here at Burton Court in the Summer of 1943. She visited Eardisland before 1943 in the Summer of 1937. The Leominster News of July 30, 1937, reported that she was the guest of Lord Somers at Eastnor Castle, and that without stopping in Leominster the Royal car proceeded in the direction of Eardisland.

"Crowds of villagers at Eardisland and visitors who had come by motor-coach from the surrounding district assembled in the village early in the afternoon to catch a glimpse of the Queen as she motored through Eardisland. A short halt was made opposite Staick House by the Royal car, which afterwards moved on and made a brief stop on the old river bridge to enable the Queen to have a view of the picturesque scene provided

by a village which is famed for its beauty. The Royal car passed over the bridge slowly and there arose loud cheers from the crowd of people and school children gathered near the war memorial. At Legion's Cross the car turned left and proceeded by way of Canon Pyon out on the Hereford-Leominster road near Wellington."

Afterwards the Queen performed a tree planting ceremony at Queen's Wood, where my stepfather the late Grevile H. Phillips, OBE, the County Land Agent, who had planned and planted Queen's Wood, handed her a special spade made with an English oak handle to plant an oak tree. The same spade was handed by him to Queen Elizabeth to plant a tree in 1957 and I have it here at Burton Court.

THE SMITHY



The Smithy, as the name implies, was an active blacksmith's shop until about the time of the second world war. Since that time it has been used as a meeting room, for groups such as W.I. and a 'Men's Club', as well as an Air Rifle Club. It also served as the HQ of the Home Guard during the Second World War. In more recent times it has been a butcher's shop, a Red Cross store and a wool shop. It was converted into a private residence in the late 1980s.
