


FORMAT

<u>YOUR LOCAL HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLOR'S REPORT – ROGER PHILLIPS</u> riphillips@herefordshire.gov.uk

We have had a mild but very wet winter with a big impact on our highways leaving potholes, section failings, vergers badly damaged and ditches pushed in. I welcome the announcement this week for extra highways funding from the government with Herefordshire being awarded over 100 million pound over the next seven years.

This will also help mature the decision this month on the Hereford Bypass strategy which will be discussed by the Cabinet setting out clear plans to reinstate road building to relieve Hereford city. Also, the council will introduce a new highway maintenance framework which will mean the council can spend additional highway funding outside of the Balfour contract. This proposal is welcome as I have recently had to escalate a matter to the contract board for non-compliance. I sent an email

outlining a request for action on a sensitive accident site in the ward which clearly laid out the issues requiring attention, and despite sending a reminder, my email wasn't even acknowledged let alone actioned and responded to. The subject matter exposed a clear breach of contract which I will continue to follow up.

Last month saw the annual finance council meeting where the budget for 2024/25 was discussed. The current conservative minority administration took over the council last May inheriting significant overspends and an unrealistic budget which left finances in a precarious state with little room to manoeuvre. The challenge was to address the predicted deficit of some £28.8 million and this has been done by finding over £19.5 million in efficiencies and savings in conjunction with 2.99% rise in council tax and 2% social care precept. While increases in council tax are regrettable a failure to address the issue would have seen us on a dangerous path. You only have to look at Birmingham, where a 10% rise in council tax is proposed this year and next to see what happens when a Council fails to keep control of its finances. The budget also proposes to address the black hole in the Council's medium term financial plan. The challenge will be delivering the budget without overspends and to help with this new spending controls have been introduced which include spending over £500 needs senior sign off approval.

The Council also passed motions unanimously on higher council tax charges on second homes and empty homes in the county.

One of the largest pressures on the budget is the cost of care provision. Nationally the number of care homes is decreasing, and the cost of care placements is rising. The Council has to ensure there are enough good quality care settings available to meet increasing demands and deeds of the local communities of Herefordshire. The Strategic Needs Assessment report highlights the numbers in the older age groups in our County growing disproportionately at a higher rate than average councils, with those aged over 85 rising even more rapidly and set to continue.

The Council's annual gross expenditure on commissioned adult care beds during 2022-23 financial year was just over £38 million (short and long stay). The Council is proposing to enter into a block purchase care contract of 15 residential and 15 care home beds for 5 years which will potentially save spot purchasing beds at a higher price and give extra financial security to the identified homes. There will be a maximum spend of £6.82 million and it will need careful management to ensure it is utilised consistently to near capacity.

The budget which includes raising 72 million in council tax was passed by 47 votes for, none against with three abstentions, and will now form part of the Council tax bill together with West Mercia Police, Hereford & Worcester Fire Service, and Parish council precepts.

THE MORTIMER MEDICAL PRACTICE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP (PPG)

Dr Black will be retiring from NHS General Practice in June after 20 years. Dr Kemp will be reducing her hours as well. The Practice is in the process of advertising for another GP partner.

The Autumn Covid and Flu Vaccination Programme showed a poor uptake, especially in the under 65 cohort who were eligible for a vaccination. The Spring Covid Booster programme will be beginning soon. The Practice will be in touch with those patients eligible. The Practice will have a new regular visiting Paramedic, Melissa from 12th February.

In January 129 patients did not attend their booked appointments; this is equivalent to 3 days of clinic time. The Practice does understand that at times patients cannot attend their appointments, but they would appreciate it if they could be informed as soon as possible so the appointment can be given to someone else.

The surgery and dispensaries will be closed for staff training on the following afternoons from 12 noon; they will re-open as normal at 8.30am the next day. A receptionist will be available until 6pm for any calls.

The E&SG is a working group of Eardisland Parish Council, anyone interested in making Eardisland a more sustainable parish is welcome to come along.

DARK SKIES

Herefordshire Wildlife Trust are exploring potential designated dark sky status in some areas of Herefordshire. Sometimes there are very good reasons of safety and security for night-time lighting, but excessive light pollution can affect the migration, breeding and feeding patterns of wildlife. Get in touch if you're interested in possibly helping with the testing and monitoring of sites in the parish.

PLASTIC FREE EARDISLAND

We're pleased to announce that Connop & Son Ltd have become the latest business in Eardisland to be recognised as a Plastic Free Champion. To achieve this, they identified and removed three items of single-use plastic from their everyday activities. They are also exploring how to work with their suppliers to reduce single-use plastic that comes into the business. Shelley Connop said " In our industry it is not easy to reduce single use plastic items - but we have done this through swapping packaging tape for a biodegradable alternative, removing cling film from the kitchen area and



receiving our milk through delivery in glass bottles. We are now ready to start our journey to the Silver Award."



We've also signed up our first 'Community Ally' (these are community spaces, groups, and events). Eardisland Village Hall have been working hard to remove single-use plastic items such as tablecloths, glasses and serving bowls/trays from their events. They have also amended their hire agreement to request hirers try and do the same. Well done EVHMC!

Please get in touch if you would like to help by becoming one of Eardisland's Plastic Free Business Champions or Community Allies.

Despite its name it's not aiming to removing all plastic from our lives. It's about stopping the use of avoidable single-use plastic.

SPRING LITTER PICK

This year's litter pick will be on Saturday 23rd March, meet at 10am **outside the village hall**. We'll be aiming to clear all the lanes in the village, Broome Lane, Burton Lane, Lyme Lane, the carpark, recreation ground etc. If anyone would like to walk a longer distance, then in the past we have also done along to Lawton's Cross and part of the A44. If anyone is really keen, then the 4-mile loop past Pigmore Common would be great to do!

This year, as part of Eardisland's Plastic Free Communities project the litter pick is part of the Million Mile Clean. https://www.sas.org.uk/plastic-pollution/million-mile-clean/

We're also teaming up with the Village Hall Management Committee's 'Go Green for Village Halls Week', so there will be FREE coffee, drinks, and biscuits available all morning in the village hall, as well as information about the efforts the EVHMC have been making to become 'greener'. Anyone is welcome to drop in during the morning to watch the rubbish pile up, enjoy some refreshments, and see how the Village Hall is increasing its sustainability.

VERGING ON WILD

Verging on Wild is a county-wide group of volunteers who work with Herefordshire Council, BB Living Places (who coordinate verge cutting), and Herefordshire Wildlife Trust. They aim to protect the best verges by listing them as Roadside Nature Reserves and managing them to increase biodiversity. It may be that they can offer advice as to if there are potential sites in Eardisland Parish (it only really applies to wide sections of verge). If anyone would like to get involved in exploring the possibility of this, then please have a look at https://www.herefordshirewt.org/vergingonwild and get in touch with me. Any changes to verge management would have to be agreed by Eardisland Parish Council, and road safety is always the priority.

TREE PLANTING CASE STUDIES

Each Parish Magazine edition this year will be highlighting parishioners who have planted trees in their gardens. We're hoping residents might take up the offer of advice and support to plant trees of their own, however large or small an area they might have. Trees are great for increasing habitat and biodiversity, provide shade in the summer, and help combat flooding and climate change. Our first case study (see elsewhere in this magazine), is about Sue and David Wallis' riverside planting, and in future editions we'll explore some other sizes and types of tree planting.

EARDISLAND COMMUNITY GARDEN

Due to popular demand, we'll be re-branding the garden for this year as **The Eardisland Pumpkin Patch** and focusing on growing a selection of edible and Halloween pumpkins. All are welcome (children, adults, grandparents) to come and plant seeds on Saturday 6th April at 10am. We'll sow some plants for the pumpkin patch, and some for you to take home. We'll also be making bird boxes (see below).

BIRD BOXES

On Saturday 6th April at 10am at The Community Garden we'll be assembling bird boxes to share out around the parish. Anyone is welcome to come and lend a hand. Putting a bird box in your garden is one of the best ways to encourage birds to visit. We'll have pre-cut wood for small and medium sized boxes suitable for wrens, tits, sparrows, and robins, so all you'll have to do is help nail and screw them together.

It'd be helpful for people to donate any old planks they might have lurking in their sheds or garages. Ideally 150mm (6") wide (but wider would be ok) and a minimum of 15mm thick. Doesn't matter if it is softwood or hard wood.

TREE PLANTING CASE STUDY

I took the short walk from the village to see Sue and David Wallis' 300+ trees which are planted on a strip of land between Broome Lane and the river Arrow. The plot is about 15 metres by 100 metres. The trees were planted in February 2020 and include a variety of native species including, Alder, Elder, Rowan, Hornbeam, Hawthorn, Willow,



Spindle, and Bird Cherry. Sue explained that the land wasn't being used for anything productive, regularly floods, and had to be mown often, so they wanted something that took less maintaining and encouraged wildlife. Bucknell Nurseries provided all the trees as small whips, along with rabbit guards. The trees were planted about 2.5 metres apart by the suppliers in less than a day, and the whole project cost around £500. Sue says that they have had to do very little maintenance apart from mowing a path through the area, and they've noticed an increase in birdlife feeding on the berries.

Swiss Roll RECIPE – A1

INGREDIENTS

4 eggs 100g (½ cup) caster sugar 100g (2/3 cup) self raising flour

FILLING

4 tbsp jam (raspberry or strawberry)

METHOD

Preheat your oven to 220C / 200C Fan / 425F.

Grease a 33 x 23 cm (13 x 9 inch) Swiss roll tin and then line it with baking or parchment paper.

Whisk the eggs and sugar together in a bowl until they are light and frothy and at least doubled in size. Using a spatula, gently fold the flour into your egg/sugar mixture. Pour the mixture into your prepared Swiss roll tin.

Bake the sponge in the oven for 8 – 10 minutes. It's ready when the sponge has turned a nice golden shade of brown and is starting to shrink away from the edges of the tin.

While the cake is cooking put a clean tea towel down on your work surface. Put a piece of baking paper / parchment paper, slightly bigger than the size of your Swiss roll tin on top. Finally, sprinkle some caster sugar (about 1 tbsp) on top. Make sure the sugar covers the baking paper as this will stop the sponge from sticking later.

Remove the cake from the oven and turn it out onto the baking paper. Carefully peel the baking paper off the bottom of your sponge. If you need to, trim the edges of your sponge with a sharp knife so you have a neat rectangle. Score a line 2cm (just under an inch) from the short edge of your sponge. Don't cut all the way through it – just enough to leave a mark. From your score mark, roll your sponge up. Use your tea towel to help you, then leave the sponge to cool.

Once your sponge has cooled, unroll it then spread the jam in the middle with a palette knife or the back of a spoon. Roll the cake up again, nice and tightly. Ready to Serve.

FROM REV ROSIE ROBERTS

Dear friends,

I wonder if you have given anything up for Lent; if so, how's it going? I expect you might be looking forward to Easter Day so you can break your fast and have that bar of chocolate, glass of wine, or packet of crisps you have been trying to avoid for the last month or so!

One thing that's brought me and my family a lot of joy in the early months of this year is the film Wonka; we have been to the cinema to see it twice and spent a lot of car journeys singing along to the soundtrack! If you haven't seen it yet, firstly - you must! It imagines the back story of Willy Wonka, where Willy arrives in a new city determined to share his magical chocolate with the world, but is initially thwarted by the 'chocolate cartel' and the sinister Mrs Scrubbit and Mr Bleacher who force him to work in their wash house. There he makes friends with the other 'inmates', who ultimately help him to realise his dream. One of the things I really love about this film is the almost childlike hope Willy brings to the other workers in the wash house who seem to have lost all hope of joy and freedom. It's a wonderful film - maybe our village hall might be able to show it at a future Flicks in the Sticks evening?!

Hope is a much-needed commodity these days; there's so much in the news and in the pressures of our daily lives that can make it hard to have hope for the future. But there are signs of hope there if we look for them, for example in the kindness and humanity we see in other people. The way that members of the Eardisland community pulled together to support those affected by the flooding in January certainly gives me hope! And, of course, we are starting to see signs of spring - another reason to have hope. 

EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT



More rain and storms to report for January. The total rainfall for the month was 76mm (2.99 inches), with temperatures ranging from 7°C to 15°C. The barometer readings ranged from 28.74 to 30.3 and the river rose from 18 inches to a record 65 inches.

Three storms were recorded, Henk on the 2nd, Isha the 21st and Joslyn on the 23rd.

The weather remained wet for February with a total of 121mm (4.76 inches recorded. Temperatures ranged from 4°C to 11°C and barometer pressures of 28.8 to 30.2. The river continuing to vary from 16 to 60 inches.

The equivalent rainfall for 2023 was January 95mm (3.71 inches) and February 8mm (0.315 inches) - considerably drier.

IT WAS 20 YEARS AGO TODAY . . .

This letter was published in Issue 82, March 2004. Greta Pennington was a Parish Councillor, although I don't recall if she was when she wrote this letter. Twenty years later, nothing has happened. Nothing. Sadly, Greta died in St Michael's hospice some years ago. The piece is in the original font – 'Times New Roman'.

Eardisland, Historic Riverside village. Joke. The only riverside walk has been "temporarily" closed for 3½ years and despite much prodding and agitation from individuals and the Ramblers' Association, Herefordshire Council has done nothing.

On Feb 3^{rd} 2004 the Regulatory Committee received a report from the Rights of Way department (ROW) proposing the adoption of the current waymarked route with the re-siting of the eroded stile further along the hedge. This was opposed by the landowner of the caravan site. Members of the Committee visited the site on the 8^{th} March prior to discussion on the 16^{th} March at the Committee meeting.

The report from the ROW dept. stated that the paths ED5 and ED6 were popular with residents and visitors to the village. We villagers are well aware of the enjoyment afforded by the paths.

At the site meeting on the 8th March, the affected landowners and the public were discouraged from attending. If the public wished to observe the proceedings they had to obtain the permission of the landowner and remain on the definitive footpath routes. This ignores the fact that it is impossible to get onto the paths. At the eastern end the stile has been eroded, the fence boarded up and a notice "Private property. No right of way" erected. About 200 yards along the route a wooden fence has been erected across the path. At the western end there is barbed wire, a locked gate and more notices preventing access.

This path, waymarked by the Council in 1994 at the landowner's request, has been the walked path, in the memory of some villagers, for over 50 years. The line of a right of way remains until it is extinguished by the responsible authority. If we chose to wade in the river about 2 feet round the eroded stile we would have the right to continue on the path. I am not suggesting we should! Where a public right of way exists along a river bank it is the duty of the highway authority to maintain that path (Highways Act 1980 s329)

Where a way over land has been enjoyed by the public as of right and without interruption for 20 years it is deemed to have been dedicated as a highway. This footpath has been in public use for many years and is marked as a right of way on OS maps.

We know this is the only path in our parish where we can get close to the river. We know what a pleasant circuit it provides. Please URGE the Council to repair the erosion and enable us to use the path again.

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

BUILDINGS IN EARDISLAND
