UPDATE FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR NOVEMBER 2025

As I sit and write this update this morning the 13th of November, there is a feeling of "calm before the storm". It is a wonderfully sunny and bright autumn morning with bright sunshine, pale blue skies and wonderful autumn colours on the leaves falling. And yet, we have already had our first Flood Alert Warning of the season. The river has risen at both Titley and here in Eardisland and, if the forecasters are to be believed, we could be in for a torrid end to the week as more storms role in. As a sailor, I welcome approaching low weather systems as they provide some wonderful winds and sailing conditions. However, as a resident like you all in a flood affected village I do not. Like so many of you I am sure, I find myself wondering as to whether, and indeed when, will we flood again?

We have had two wonderful events since my last note, the first being the annual craft fair with both new and old exhibitors demonstrating just what a wonderful talented group we are. I am conscious of the huge amount of work and sheer effort that goes into events such as this and would like to place on record my thanks to Phil Milchard and his team for all that they do in bringing together this event and show casing our village in such a positive way. Thank you, Phil!

The second event was one we share annually with so many communities and organisation around our country, namely that of Remembrance Sunday and the laying of wreaths at the war memorial. It is always such a moving ceremony. We owe so much to those that gave the ultimate so that may we live, as we do, in such a peaceful and beautiful part of the country. We will remember them.

As I am sure you are aware, many properties in the village have now had the Property Flood Resilience Measures promised by the EA fitted and installed. The yellow Whitehouse vans have been regular visitors to the village over the course of the summer and are only now finishing the final properties. I can only hope that the measures do help but am extremely conscious of the fact that there remain numerous properties that still need such measures and indeed some that would have benefitted from a more flexible approach and a greater understanding of the challenges faced.

That said, the EA have been doing what they can. The work they promised to do with regards to clearing riverbanks between the upper and lower weirs has been completed with the aim of speeding the flow of water through and out of the village. I can only hope that it aids us all.

Some of you will have had the new "sandbags" delivered to you by our volunteers in our Flood Group yesterday. This group, under the leadership of Councillor Rebecca Rhys-Evans, deserves our gratitude. They do a tremendous service to our community in helping us all as we face the threats posed by flooding. Thank you all!

As a Council the issue of flooding is one that we focus on and with the help of Roger Philips, our Ward Councillor, we continue to raise the issue and seek action at every available opportunity. We have started on the consultation with regards to a solution to the collapsed riverbank wall on the north bank of the river and are seeking support from Herefordshire Council in the funding of the repair work necessary.

Some of you may have noticed in recent days further collapses in the riverbank wall on the southside of the riverbank. This is of course of concern and I am grateful that the landowner concerned is already in consultation with the EA as to effecting urgent repairs. To all riparian rights owners I make a plea, please do what you can to ensure the banks and ditches etc are clear of debris to aid the flow of water through and away from our village.

In my last report I advised that the remediation work to the kitchen extension had started. The replacement windows were in and work to the cladding was scheduled to begin on the 15th September. Well, I am extremely pleased to advise that it is now completed, and that it does, well at least in my opinion, look significantly better. Once again, I must thank Dave Carr who has done such a terrific job on behalf of us all in overseeing the work on behalf of the Parish Council. We really are most grateful Dave!

You may recall that in my last update I advised you of all the resignations of Chris Bivand as Editor and Patricia Gill as Advertising Manager of this Magazine. Well, I am very pleased to announce that after our last council meeting, we have appointed Sarah and Angus Wrixon to take on the editorship. They are relatively new to the village and are obviously parishioners. They will take over the role following Chris' and Patricia's last magazine in March 2026. I am sure that we will hear a lot more from them indue course and, I am equally sure that they have a lot to offer to the role. Welcome both!

Here's hoping for as dry a winter as possible!!

HEREFORDSHIRE COUNCILLOR'S REPORT ROGER PHILLIPS

The further collapses on the river bank in the centre of the village highlights the ongoing issues we have with our river and flooding. I continue to liaise and work with the Parish Council, Herefordshire Council, Balfour Beatty, Lugg Drainage Board and the Environment Agency on prevention and response to our flooding issues. While there are many frustrations, I genuinely believe consistent engagement with these bodies maintains focus on our community, and gains cooperation and sensible support as we mitigate and navigate our way through difficult challenges.

Working with the Parish Council we have invited the head of planning to the next Parish Council meeting on 11th December, to explain the issues regarding future developments in the county and also our own community. The Government has imposed a target on Herefordshire to build nearly 30,000 extra homes over the next 20 years (there are currently 82,000 homes). We are at a critical stage to discuss where and what type of housing is required and understand the pressures on our infrastructure. We all recognise that the recent developments at Barons Cross will certainly have a pressure on the Leominster highways.

For many years I have held a senior role in the Rural Services Network - a cross party English lobby group of over 200 councils and rural organisations campaigning for rural services and areas. Please visit the website for more details – https://www.rsnonline.org.uk/#

We recently held an online conference over four days making plain the inequalities that rural areas continue to face: underfunded services, fragile transport, patchy communication connectivity and a shortage of affordable homes. But it also showcased the resilience and innovation of rural places, where councils, private sector members, voluntary organisations and communities are working together to find solutions.

A central theme was fair funding. Rural councils face higher delivery costs, yet often receive less government support per head, leaving residents paying more in council tax for fewer services. The figures are stark: urban areas receive 40% more per head in Government Funded Spending Power, while rural residents pay on average 20% more in Council Tax. Unless funding mechanisms properly account for rural circumstances, communities will remain at a disadvantage.

Equally important is how we measure deprivation and success. Too often, national metrics are designed around urban experience. They miss the realities of

rural economies, where employment may look healthy but masks seasonal work, low wages and high housing costs. Deprivation in rural areas is frequently hidden and easily overlooked, yet policy continues to be shaped by headline figures that reinforce the myth of rural affluence.

The week's discussions also highlighted the scale of untapped potential within rural areas. A report from the Rural Coalition shows that, with the right policy framework, the rural economy could generate up to £19 billion more each year in tax revenues. Rural England is not simply a place of need; it is a place of opportunity. Unlocking that potential requires investment in infrastructure, fairer funding, and policies that reflect rural realities.

Across the conference we saw examples of how that potential is already being realised: from community-led transport schemes and local energy generation to digital inclusion projects and rural businesses driving innovation.


These initiatives show what rural can achieve when barriers are removed. The Rural Services Network will make sure rural voices are heard, because stronger rural communities mean a stronger nation.

Christmas is a time of merriment and good cheer, and a time to let our hair down, but it is a time when we shouldn't let our guard down. Robberies and other property crimes, such as burglaries and thefts, do tend to increase around the Christmas season. This is due to several factors, including longer, darker nights that provide cover for criminals, and the presence of valuable new gifts in homes which makes

them an attractive target. Other contributing factors include people leaving homes vacant and businesses closed for holiday travel. Here are a few points that might help.

Secure your home or business: Make sure all doors and windows are locked, especially when you are away from home or your business is closed for the holiday period. Consider using a security system.

Conceal valuables: Do not leave new, expensive gifts visible through your windows. Don't leave presents visible in your car while shopping, and take them inside as soon as you get home.

Be mindful of social media: Avoid posting about your holiday plans or photos of expensive gifts in a way that could advertise your home as an easy target.

Neighbourhood Watch membership provides you with access to the website and further crime prevention advice including a burglary prevention toolkit.

EARDISLAND CRAFT & PRODUCE FAIR

A week or so before the fair I hopefully checked the weather forecast for the day of the show and was happy to see a smiling sun with a little cloud. Great I thought, we should be in for another bumper day, with a heavy footfall.

Sadly, from then onwards, the forecast started to change and warnings were soon being given for strong winds and rain. So often these forecasts prove to be wrong, so, thanks to the efforts of a number of helpers, the marquee was erected on the Wednesday morning. That evening it became clear that once again we were facing a named storm, Amy would be with us on the Friday and stay until the Saturday, with heavy rain. A big decision was required. Should we cancel or take our chances? Phone calls were made and the unanimous decision was we would run with it, thus becoming the only local event not to cancel. Stall-holders were contacted and given the opportunity to cancel with a full refund, with a dozen or so taking up this option, mostly those who intended setting up in gazebos.

At 7am on the day of the show, several helpers and I arrived at the churchyard to find the ends of the marquee were exposed, flapping in the gales, with metal fixings having worked their way loose and several bungees snapped. A number of heavy sandbags did the job (thanks Hugh Lowe) and were enough to ensure the structure stayed in place. A few brave stall-holders arrived and valiantly erected their gazebos, some more successfully than others, but by 10am the show opened and our fantastic public started to arrive. Within an hour the show was busy with brisk sales. Understandably not in the numbers of previous years, but by the end of the day a respectable 415, down around 150 on 2024.

We were so fortunate the rain stayed away, although the wind gusted throughout. There are so many people to thank for their invaluable help, not only on the day, but in the build-up and days after. It's impossible to name everyone, but you know who you are. So, to the marquee erecters, the car parkers, the ticket sellers, the sign erecters, those who helped in so many different ways in the village hall, the cake bakers, the barbecue team, the registration team, the table importers and exporters, the social media team, our accountant and not forgetting the stall-holders themselves, THANK YOU!

Finally, a huge thanks to Jon of GRC Ltd of Hereford, for the invaluable use of his company's Starlink satellite system, which enabled all stall-holders to make easy on-line sales through their phones. Jon was present all day, communicating with everyone making sales, ensuring their phones were correctly set up and connected to their system.

To me the money side is not the biggest factor of this event, nevertheless it is important, and for the record it raised £4,077. As in previous years the church takes 50%, with Eardisland in Bloom and the village hall sharing the remainder.

On a personal front both Richard Kirby and I have decided to call it a day and bow out gracefully. We started the show 10 years ago and never imagined it would become such a hit with stall-holders and the public alike. I'm very hopeful a new organiser(s) will be found, enabling the show to continue. If you're interested in taking on a role, please let either of us know.

Rector Vacancy – we have had several applications which have been short-listed for interview. The candidates will have an Orientation Day before being interviewed on Tuesday 25th November. However a new Rector, if appointed, may not be able to be in place until the summer, depending on their personal and professional circumstances.

'STIR UP' SUNDAY – This is the last Sunday before Advent, when the Collect prayer begins 'Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people.' Families traditionally gathered to make their Christmas puddings so that they had time to mature before Christmas. And add the sixpences!

ADVENT is a 'waiting' time as we prepare and remember the meaning of Christmas; in church the 4 Sundays of Advent are celebrated with the lighting of candles on our Advent Wreath. The beautiful purple hangings come out for this season and are changed to celebratory White and Gold for Christmas Day. So here are all the lovely things that we have organised for you to enjoy during December.

TRAVELLING CRIB – this is a box containing the Holy Family and all the people who came to worship baby Jesus. Households take turns to 'host' for a night during Advent; unpack the figures and arrange them as you like, add the fairy lights to illuminate them, think about the wonder of the birth of baby Jesus. **There will be a list of dates in the shop** and you can come and sign up for a day, making arrangements with the family before/after you a convenient time to pass on the box. Essentially, tricksters will take any opportunity to separate you illegally from your money. Always be suspicious of telephone calls about you bank account (see BBC's Scam Interceptors). If you get a call supposedly about your bank account, winter fuel allowance, tax or anything similar, listen carefully to what is said BUT DO NOT SAY ANYTHING. If they do not provide specific contact details, put down the phone WITHOUT ANY COMMENT.

If they do provide details, still put the phone down and check numbers or details on your bank card, statement or any official communication. If you have any doubts, ask a friend or family member before taking any action.

EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT

The weather for Eardisland began to change after the dry summer. September's rainfall measured 97mm (3.82 inches) and frost showing on the 22nd and 23rd. Barometer pressures ranging from 29.24 to 30.1 were recorded and temperatures ranged from 16°C to 23°C. The river levels were low at 9°inches.

The weather for October continued to show more rain with 56mm (2.20 inches) recorded. Barometer readings ranged from 29.00 to 30.14 with temperatures recorded at 11°C to 19°C. Despite the increase in rainfall the river remained low at 9 inches.

The equivalent rainfall for September 2024 was 142mm (5.6 inches) and October 154mm (6.06 inches).

STORM CLAUDIA

Subsequent to Doug's report above, storm Claudia moved up from the south, hitting Herefordshire on the afternoon and night of Friday 14th November. The storm had made its way through Tenerife and other Canary Islands, where considerable damage was done from the rain and high winds. It progressed, mainly to the west of the UK, hitting Devon and south Wales, then up to our part of the world and thence further up the country.

Eardisland was cut off because of flooding, but it has to be said that we escaped relatively lightly. Pictures of Monmouth and Eywas Harold – to the south-west of Hereford, showed scenes of considerable flooding.

Whilst our house, Arrow Bank, is prone to flooding, Ruth and I escaped with no water ingress (at the time of writing!).

Over this year, the considerable efforts by the Parish Council and our Herefordshire Councillor, Roger Phillips, have persuaded the Environment Agency to undertake considerable work to ameliorate the effects of flooding on many individual properties. The work in the village has now mostly been completed. I, for one, am grateful to all concerned for the efforts made.

The best way to check river levels is to go to this website: https://check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk/station/2195

This gives the river level at Eardisland (the sensor is on the grass by the bridge). It is helpful to look upstream, to Titley. Water from there usually takes around six hours to get here, although this time, for unknown reasons, the time-lag was longer at around seven hours.

Postings on Facebook are also invaluable because they give very local information. Thanks to those who post so usefully and Eardisland Parish Council Flood Response Group.
