#### EARDISLAND PARISH COUNCIL

We've been fortunate to enjoy some wonderful weather recently, which has enabled us all to get out and enjoy our beautiful village. The sunshine has brought Eardisland to life, from colourful gardens, the beautiful, peaceful corners by the river, and it's been lovely to see people taking in the views and appreciating the setting. The beauty of the village continues to draw in visitors, and it's a reminder of how lucky we are to live in such a special place.

On 19<sup>th</sup> May, the Annual Parish Meeting took place, where Jerry Blyth was re-elected as Chair and Shelley Connop as Vice Chair of the Parish Council. The meeting also included a series of reports reflecting the past year's activity in the village — covering everything from the Village Hall Committee to the Church, the WI, the Environment Sustainability Group and more. A full list of the reports is available to read on the Parish Council website.

On Monday 10<sup>th</sup> June, Eardisland was included in a formal site visit as part of a Section 19 Flood Investigation, commissioned by Herefordshire Council following the dreadful flooding we experienced in January and October 2024. Chair of the Parish Council, Jerry Blyth, and Councillor Rebecca Rhys-Evans attended on behalf of the Parish Council.

Section 19 investigations are a legal duty under the Flood and Water Management Act 2010. They aim to identify what caused a flood event, clarify which organisations are responsible for managing the risks, and make recommendations for future action.

The visit to Eardisland brought together representatives from several key bodies, including:

- The Environment Agency
- River Lugg Internal Drainage Board
- Binnies (technical consultants)
- Highways
- Herefordshire Council officers
- Our local Ward Member
- Eardisland Parish Council

The group spent around three hours walking through the village with us, during which we were able to highlight key areas affected by flooding — including drainage issues and locations where surface water regularly collects and is difficult to clear. It was a constructive and detailed visit, and it was encouraging to have the opportunity to show the reality of the challenges we face first-hand.

The investigation will result in a formal report containing a series of recommendations. While it's important to note that these do not guarantee that

any specific works will follow, the process does mark a step forward in recognising the local impact of flooding here in Eardisland. The Parish Council will continue to follow developments closely and update residents as things progress.

The Parish Council is also in the process of updating the Welcome Pack that's given to new residents. It's a small way of helping people settle in and find out what's happening in the parish. We've already been in touch with many of the regular groups and organisations, but if you're involved in something that you feel would be a beneficial addition to the Welcome Pack, please contact either Rebecca or Shelley to discuss it.

Meetings are usually held on the second Thursday of each month, but dates may occasionally vary.

#### Herefordshire's Call for Sites for Houses

Despite Herefordshire Council's objections, the Government is persisting with its increased housing target on our County of 27,260 new dwellings in the next 20 years. A rate on average of over 1,350 per year which we have never ever achieved in the County, where we currently have 82,000 homes for our population of 190,000 people. We have made the case of lack of transport and public services infrastructure or capacity, and where the people are coming from with the skills to build all these properties, but government has maintained the target.

So, Herefordshire Council, as the planning authority, must begin again a new core strategy identifying potential sites and as a result a call for sites is being issued to landowners in Herefordshire. In the first instance, potential for significant increases in our city and market towns will be examined. I must, however, stress that any new sites must reflect the government's policy of sustainable locations and as such the overwhelming majority of our parishes will be classified as open countryside with planning strictly limited. The most obvious potential sites will be around our main village settlements. Landowners will need to assess the sustainability and deliverability of the sites, consider the constraints and how to overcome them. Last time Neighbourhood Plans were developed with funding from the government to gives local communities more say over

local development. However, the government has recently announced that they will not provide any funding for future Neighbourhood Plans leaving costs to be picked up by the parish councils.

For Eardisland, which has been designated a village for development for over 60 years, the issue is identifying sites that are not at risk of flooding or have an impact on the flood plain. I will work with the Parish Council and community, but I know there are differing concerns on future building or the consequences or not. The other problems are we still have to deal with the phosphate restrictions on housing development in the Lugg catchment area and deliver more housing appropriate for our working families and maturing population.

The draft accounts for the County Council 2024/25 have been published and show considerable tight control of finances particularly the pressurised departments of adult and children's care. The Council recorded an underspend on the revenue account of 500K which is a much more stable position than our neighbouring authorities. We will have to wait till December to know of the government support for 2026/27 but indications are they will be tough for rural local authorities.

We have had some successful fundraising events recently that have been enjoyed in the Village Hall including another of our Quiz Nights where teams have challenged each other in the amusing question rounds. Mandy has joined the regular hirers with her offer of stretch classes every Tuesday afternoon  $2-2.45\,\mathrm{pm}$ . The classes are aimed at anyone looking to improve their balance, bone health, flexibility and strength.

We have started collecting items for our Tombola stand at this year's Annual Duck Races on the 24<sup>th</sup> August (save the date), please have a look at home to see if you can spare some items. If you use the internet, email, telephone or merely answer the door to a stranger, you could be the target of unsolicited approaches by people who, by way of fraud, want to obtain your personal information or even your money. There are many different types of fraud and scam with Phishing, Vishing and Smishing being some of the more widely used.

Along with more general crime prevention advice, Neighbourhood Watch membership provides you with weekly Fraud Alerts from West Mercia Police along with access to online resources that provide information about these fraudulent activities, how to recognise them and avoid falling victim to them.

Dr Callum Bartlett will be retiring this summer. Dr Matt Howard will be starting as a new GP on 1<sup>st</sup> September.

A new system called Total Triage will be coming into operation 1<sup>st</sup> October 2025. This will be an online service which hopefully will help the 8.30am telephone rush for appointments. Patients will be asked to complete an online form with questions about their symptoms / problems. This will be triaged by a GP in the

surgery and patients will be offered either a same day appointment, an appointment for another day, a telephone conversation, a prescription left at the dispensary to be picked up, or an appointment to see a Practice Nurse, Advanced Nurse Practitioner, Physician Associate, or advice to attend a Minor Injuries Department or Accident and Emergency Department.

For patients who have special needs or have no internet access they will still be able to ring the surgery normally. More in depth information will be available in the coming months as to how this service will come online. The Practice wanted the PPG members to inform as many patients as possible before its implementation.

#### EARDISLAND PARISH COUNCIL ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY GROUP

The E&SG is a working group of Eardisland Parish Council, anyone interested in making Eardisland a more sustainable parish is welcome to come along.

#### **CRAYFISH PLAGUE**

The Environment Agency is investigating the deaths of our rare and legally protected native white-clawed crayfish on the River Arrow (Herefordshire) between Kington and Pembridge.

White-clawed crayfish look like miniature lobsters; they hide away under rocks and logs during the day and emerge during the night to eat. They are our largest native, freshwater invertebrate but are now rare in Britain. The few remaining populations of white-clawed crayfish are very vulnerable to this disease and also face local extinction due to competition from non-native crayfish species and loss of habitat.

The disease can be transferred to white-clawed crayfish in other parts of the catchment via water and mud on damp clothes, footwear, bike tyres, vehicle tyres, fishing or boating equipment or any machinery, or by dogs, horses or livestock.

If you are using equipment in any river, to stop the spread of the plague, other infectious diseases or invasive species, please follow these steps: clean off any mud or vegetation and remove any standing water. Either thoroughly dry the equipment, preferably in sunlight, making sure all nooks and crannies are dry OR treat with a disinfectant capable of killing fungal spores. Do not use damp equipment in another stream on the same day.

In addition:

- 1. Report any sighting of dead or distressed crayfish to the EA incident line.
- 2. Avoid entering the River Arrow, between Kington and Pembridge.
- 3. Biosecurity measures should be taken when visiting any watercourse to avoid spreading invasive species and disease. Particularly, thoroughly check, clean and dry anything entering the water courses on the River Arrow, between Kington and Pembridge

## If you see dead crayfish or an environmental incident, please phone the Environment Agency on 0800 80 70 60.

Please do not handle or remove live or dead crayfish. It is illegal to do this without a licence.

#### **FLOWERS OF THE ARROW**

Ella Curry has been making progress on her Kew Gardens Grow Wild Youth Grant project 'Flowers of the Arrow'. She was awarded a £500 grant earlier this year to identify, survey, record, and paint native river plants along the River Arrow.

You may have spotted Ella carrying out her botanical surveys throughout the village recently, accompanied by Ben Woodcock (who is helping to support Ella throughout her project). She now has a species list for the native river plants of the Arrow and will be spending the next few months producing paintings of many of these species. She will then be compiling a pamphlet containing reproductions of her paintings alongside information on how to identify each species, as well as their importance for the Arrow (and of course, some fun facts too!). Once created, it is planned that copies of this pamphlet will be stocked in the Eardisland Community Shop for all to enjoy.

Ella's paintings will be exhibited in Eardisland Village Hall, with the exhibition currently planned for September. This will be a free exhibition, with prints of her paintings available for purchase. All proceeds and optional

donations will go to the Eardisland Environment and Sustainability Group to support further environmental initiatives within the community. She hopes to see many of you there!

Ella also plans to use her newly refreshed botanical identification skills to run a series of identification workshops and/or talks for the local community as a way of further sharing her knowledge and passion for native plants and the natural world. She will share details of these sessions in due course.

Ella says: "My project aims to highlight the importance of native aquatic flora in and around the River Arrow, particularly regarding native river plants' roles as indicators of river health and the importance of river buffer zones and aquatic biodiversity. I hope that my project will enthuse and educate the local community on these topics through my art exhibition, informative materials, and future botany identification sessions."

#### FLAPJACK RECIPE - A1

#### **INGREDIENTS**

250g jumbo porridge oats 125g butter plus extra for the tin 125g light brown sugar 2-3 tbsp golden syrup (depending on how gooey you want it)

#### **METHOD**

#### Step 1

Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6.

#### Step 2

Put the oats, butter, sugar and golden syrup in a large bowl and work until well mixed – be careful not to overmix or the oats may lose their texture.

#### Step 3

Lightly butter a 20 x 20cm baking tin and add the mixture. Press into the corners with the back of a spoon so the mixture is flat and score into 12 squares.

#### Step 4

Bake for around 15 mins until golden brown.

#### Step 5

Leave to cool the ready to serve.

A time to say thank you for those who have been on those journeys – teachers and all who work in those places to support and encourage us for our journeys to be not solitary but in community, with our friends and classmates. It maybe that you are not moving far, to the next classroom and a new teacher, or it maybe that you are off to a new school or to find a job. If the latter, then it is time to pack your bags.

What do you need to pack? An education - well that is something that is part of you from the process, an ethos — a set of values that formed how you worked with others and how you view the world, a group of friends that have gone on the journey with you and you enjoyed their company, a few precious

All are invited to this special service at which I know the churchwardens will be sending me out on the next adventure. I hear that retirement is as busy if not more than work??

Jesus said to his disciples when he was leaving them - Do not let your hearts be troubled, Trust in God, Trust also in me...... I go to prepare a place for you......(and when Doubting Thomas said we don't know the way) Jesus said I am the way, the truth, the life. I will be trusting that Jesus/God/The Holy Spirit will show me the way forward and I hope and pray that that will be the same for you. So there's something to pack, pack the faith you have found, it might be something that you can share with new friends who haven't had that kind of education and don't know about the love of God that means that they are very precious.

Pack your bags carefully – you need to travel light but don't throw away something precious.

#### **FAREWELL TO JULIE READ**

Julie... how to sum up twelve years of ministry and all that you have come to mean to us?

All of us will have shared different experiences and relationships with Julie during the twelve years she has been our priest. And as she said in the May Parish Magazine it has certainly been a journey. Some know her only in passing, or have met her at events, had brief chats or attended services she has taken. Some will know Julie as she has been with them in times of illness and sadness, marriage or baptism. Others have seen her more regularly, worked and worshipped with her, and got to know her well.

Julie is our example of true Christian love, care, generosity and faithfulness. She listens intently and observes keenly, caring for her flock in ways seen and unseen. She encourages gifts, talents, ideas and helps bring them to fruition. For many she is a confidante with wise counsel and presence in the various happenings in our lives.

Her musical gifts have brought us joy – in Taize worship, the Steel Pan group, conducting choral items, accompanying our singing on the piano, playing her oboe, introducing new, beautiful music and words and always leading singing with her beautiful soprano voice.

The Bishop has entrusted to her the responsibility the care and training of two curates and an intern – all of whom are now 'flying' as priests with the wisdom of her insightful guidance. She has encouraged and supported a Reader through her training. Bishop Richard also appointed her Prebendary (known as Canon in some places) which is an honour given to priests for accomplishment and esteem. It was our joy to attend that service and see her led to her special stall in the quire of the cathedral.

I know she means a lot to the children in our area, for being a school governor and supporting the staff, taking assemblies, bringing the children to church for special events and services, planning activities for them. Now we have a thriving children's ministry in Messy Church (family worship with activities, stories and breakfast), Open the Book (acting Bible stories with everyone taking part), iSingPop (activities and worship for slightly older children), Forest Church and now a Youth Group. A tremendous achievement: attendance at those services is now higher than the total adults across all our churches!

There is a Pilgrim group in our church; praying, discussing, learning and forming firm bonds of fellowship; across the parishes a Bible study group, a craft group; then there are all the PCCs and Church Wardens she encourages and inspires – and indeed, the huge and sometimes nightmarish task of leading Building Projects!

Of course, Julie hasn't done this single-handed – it is her skill at fostering talents and encouraging that has built teams of people who can lead and organise; that co-operate across the Benefice and share their knowledge.

And then there's God whom she loves, trusts, gives thanks to, asks for help, relies on - this she has taught, given examples, inspired, increased faith.... a neverending list is possible here! We know that we have been blessed to have her as our priest, and she will always have a very special place in our hearts.

Like the rest of us, she has had her share of low times – including serious surgery; and I hope that she found that we supported her in the manner that she has so well and often supported us. Each time she has found new learning from her experiences and shared that insight.

It has been my privilege, particularly being organist, to work alongside Julie in the 'life events' services – baptisms, marriages, funerals. I am constantly amazed at the particular gift she has of saying the right words, of comfort, humour, welcome, thoughtfulness etc in exactly the right tone of voice, whenever they are needed.

Anyone who thinks a priest just writes a few sermons, visits a few people and takes services on Sundays is very sadly mistaken. It is a mammoth task to organise a Benefice, attend endless Diocesan, Deanery, Chapter meetings; training and initiatives to bring back to the parishes – and keep up with a never-ending stream of emails and phone calls all from people who need to know something or need help. And she is there. Drops everything for anyone in crisis and holds their hand.

In everything there are huge amounts of laughter. Sometimes things have gone wrong, or we have forgotten something, or something unexpected has happened in a service and we have a good laugh either during or afterwards. More laughter in meetings than I have ever known. Then there are sometimes the Mad Ideas — usually after she's been on holiday — we roll our eyes at her and laugh. But mad though they seem, they are generally good ideas, and we get on with the business of putting them into practice. I didn't realise that Mad Ideas were such a priest 'thing' until Bishop Richard preached and said that we were lucky that he hadn't returned from his sabbatical with a long list of them!

Julie is fond of a drop of gin or of bubbly at social occasions and her final farewell service will be followed by the latter. Come and say thank you and show your appreciation of the ministry of this amazing lady, true and faithful servant of God.

#### LEOMINSTER FOOD BANK



We have been experiencing extremely busy times during the first quarter of this year. We hoped the cost-of-living crisis might be receding by this point, but this is not reflected in the numbers of people we are seeing, or the experiences people in difficulty are sharing with us.

By early May we had already distributed more than 1000 food parcels to people in Leominster and its surrounds, of which over 500 were for children.

In January of this year, we had to move to much smaller premises while building work was being carried out at the Old Priory. We hoped this would be very short term, but we are still unable to return and anticipate a long wait, so we are now considering alternatives. This has increased our costs as we are giving some food parcels via supermarket vouchers to reduce the number of food bags we transport across town.

We now shop for the majority of our food items, topping up with food donated to us. This means that we have become increasingly appreciative of the generosity of our regular givers, because this consistent monthly income allows us some security in which to plan and weather the storms of ever-increasing food poverty.

#### EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT

May saw a continuation of the lack of rain with only 25mm (0.985 inches) recorded, barometer readings ranged from 29.58 to 30.04 and temperatures from 16°C to 24°C were recorded. The river level remained at a steady 15 inches.

June showed a small improvement in the rainfall with 45mm (1.77 inches) recorded. Barometer readings ranged from 29.4 to 30.08. Temperatures rose towards the end of the month rising from 18°C to 30°C. River levels dropped to 10 inches.

The equivalent rainfall for May 2024 was 64mm (2.52 inches) and June 28mm (1,1 inches).

Nature-wise, on visiting the swans this morning, the male swan was on its own swimming up and down near the nest site, eventually leaving the water and going to visit the nest which appeared to be empty, so it looks like another year without cygnets unless she has taken them off somewhere?

#### EARDISLAND WAR MEMORIAL

The war memorial lists names of men killed in the first and second world wars. This handsome memorial was designed by Captain A B W Greenhough MC, who lived in the Staick House. It was built in the early 1920s at a cost of £208, which was raised by public subscription. It is interesting to note that this represents around £1200 in today's terms. The land was donated by Mr Gittens who lived in the Court House.
