

OBITUARY: TONY TINDALE



Tony, eldest son of Bryan and Maureen Tindale, was born at the Simpson Memorial Hospital in Edinburgh on 20th April 1944. He was joined shortly by a brother, Michael.

Subsequently, the family moved from Scotland back to Sunderland where both parents were originally from. At the end of the war, his father went to work for the Bahraini oil company in Bahrain, surveying the island and designing roads and such like. When Tony was around five years old, the boys and their mother joined their father out in Bahrain.

Tony attended Shrewsbury school from the age of eleven, until he was 18. He immediately joined the Royal Air Force in 1963 as a Cadet Officer at RAF Feltwell. Unusually, although selected to fly, he asked to follow his logistic heart and encouraged by 'for the want of a nail - a shoe was lost . . .' he became a Supply Officer on passing out from his Officer training.

Tony followed a career in the RAF encompassing various tours: in Aden, as a 19-year-old under fire; in Coastal Command, looking after boats for the RAF; two tours in Germany and around the UK. One memorable tour was in Lincolnshire, at RAF Waddington as his first tour as Squadron Leader, and where he met his wife to be, Julie, early in 1981. She was a Nursing Officer in the Princess Mary's RAF Nursing Service, stationed down the road in the RAF hospital Nocton Hall, working as a midwife. Tony had been married previously, and had one son, Guy. Tony divorced at about the time he was posted to RAF Waddington.

Tony and Julie were married on 29th August 1981. The following year in the spring, the Falklands War 'exploded'. Julie didn't see much of Tony for about three months in the early months of 1982, as he disappeared into the opsplanning bunker and was highly involved in getting the Vulcans air-to-air refuelling and able to fly down to the south Atlantic to bomb the runway at Port Stanley.

Shortly after the surrender of the Argentinians, their first child was born - a girl Hannah. In early 1983, Tony was posted to RAF HQ in Whitehall as the RAF fuel expert, really making a name and reputation for himself. Their second child was a boy born in 1984. More various postings followed.

Tony's career ended in 1994, with his retirement after 31 years' service, here in Herefordshire at RAF Credenhill, now home of the SAS. After leaving the RAF, Tony went to work, in 1994, in Riyadh Saudi Arabia as a Tutor in Logistics for the Royal Saudi Airforce Academy, leaving in 2001.

Tony retired when he came back to the UK, but got bored after two weeks and began training as a magistrate! He served for twelve years, but this had to come to an end when he was 70 - something he grumbled about – it was a role that had suited him to a T!

In November 2020, during the Covid pandemic, Tony and Julie moved from where they lived in Solihull to the idyllic village here in Eardisland. When Tony could, he volunteered in the Community Shop, which is where most of you will have met him. He managed two years being 'Santa Claus' in the village Christmas Grotto.

In August 2024 Tony was given the shattering diagnosis of untreatable cancer. Tony lost a valiant final battle at home - as he wished, with just Julie nursing him. He passed away on Thursday 10 April 2025 - 10 days short of his $81^{\rm st}$ birthday.

Following his wishes, there will be a memorial party for old friends and new and old comrades from across the years to gather, share stories and remember him.

I am very grateful to Julie for sending this to me. Tony was very much a 'larger-than-life' character and I was sad to hear of his death. I remember the bombing raid on the Falklands' airstrip, because it was very difficult logistically. The range of the Vulcan bomber, one of the 'flying wing' bombers was some 7400 km for the Mk 2, whilst the Falkland Islands are around 12,800 km away, say 26,000 km round trip. So, Operation Black Buck, as it was called, the longest in RAF history, required detailed analysis of how effectively to use refuelling aircraft to refuel both the Vulcan and the refuelling aircraft themselves.

EARDISLAND PARISH COUNCIL

As I sit and write this latest bulletin the rain is falling and it appears that the wonderful summer weather that we have had has come to an abrupt and grinding halt. We have though been able to enjoy some wonderful weather over the summer, which has enabled us all to get out and enjoy our beautiful village. It never ceases to amaze me how lucky we are to have so many volunteers within our community who give up so much of their time to make our village the beautiful and welcoming place that it is. I do not know the numbers but it certainly seems that the village has seen an increasing number of visitors.

By the time you read this article two of the village's major annual events will have taken place, namely the Duck Race and the Village Show. My thanks to

all who have helped in organising and bringing together these events which really do bring out the best in our community. I hope you all enjoyed the events. The summer is traditionally a quiet time for the Council with no meeting held during August. That does not mean that everything stops.

Further to the formal site visit as part of a Section 19 Flood Investigation, commissioned by Herefordshire Council in June we had a further high-level meeting with senior and high-level representatives from the Asset Performance Team at the Environment Agency.

The visit to Eardisland brought together representatives from several key bodies, including:

- The Environment Agency
- Concerned and Interested Parishioners
- Herefordshire Council officers
- Our local Ward Member
- Members of Eardisland Parish Council & Parish Clerk.

The group spent around three hours walking through the village examining what they refer to as "Assets", to you and I water courses, weirs, culverts, bridges etc. It was interesting to hear the views of the EA Seniors and particularly their views as to the responsibilities of Riperian Rights owners. It was a constructive and detailed visit, and it was encouraging to have the opportunity to show the reality of the challenges we face first-hand, interestingly they did not shy away from answering challenging questions. We are most grateful to Hugh Lowe for his detailed knowledge and the insight offered up which it is hoped the EA took onboard.

As pointed out in the last article, it is important to note that these visits and reports do not guarantee that any specific works will follow, but the process does mark a step forward in recognising the local impact of flooding here in Eardisland.

That said, and subsequent to the visit in June, we have had confirmation form the Floodrisk Team at Herefordshire Council that Balfour Beaty will be conducting works in the village this month.

"BBLP have confirmed that works at Eardisland are scheduled for 10 September. They'll be working on the flood arch to the right of the main river bridge, next to the village shop. The plan is to remove a patch of Himalayan Balsam growing in a silt buildup downstream of the right arch, followed by desilting of that arch."

It is hoped that the desilting work in this area will aid with the drainage from the main road through the village. Many of you may well have noticed the directional white arrows around many of the drains which have been identified by Balfour following the meeting in June. These indicate that some of them drain into the Millstream and as we were at pains to point out to them in June were restricted in the ability to drain because of the silting up in the Millstream.

We will also see a team from the EA conduct work during September. I quote from James Roberts, Asset Performance Manager at the EA "I've arranged for the field team to carry out some channel maintenance, this will hopefully be middle of September. When the field team give a date, I will share and try to be on-site myself".

The visit will now have happened by the time this is published as it will be conducted on the 8th of September. There will be an update in next Magazine. These two activities are encouraging signs that our efforts to secure help are producing results. As always, the Parish Council will continue to follow developments closely and update residents as things progress.

Many of you will by now have heard that Chris Bivand and Patricia Gill have both resigned as Editor and Advertising Manager of the Parish Magazine. It is only right that on behalf of the Parish Council, and indeed the village, that I publicly thank them both for all that they have done and achieved during the 25 years serving our community. I am acutely aware that the Magazine is seen by many as an informative means of letting us all know what is going on within our community and indeed what has happened historically. I will write more in my next article. But in the meantime, if any of you do think that you could potentially fill the huge hole, please do look at the vacancy advert. Thank you, Chris and Patricia, for all that you have done. We really do appreciate it.

It is also with regret that I advise of another resignation from an important role on behalf of the Council. Many of you will have seen the Speedwatch Group in action at either end of the village. Diane Lee has withdrawn from her role as Coordinator of the Eardisland Speedwatch Volunteer Group, effective from March 2026. Diane has served our community in her role since the group's inception in 2018 and has made a significant contribution to road safety within our community. Thank you, Diane, we appreciate the significant contribution you have made. As with the magazine vacancies, if anyone thinks this may be a role that would interest them, please do take a look at the vacancy notice.



Remediation work on the village hall extension has started. The replacement windows are in and work to the cladding is scheduled to begin on the 15th September. When completed it will look significantly better. Our thanks to Dave Carr who has undertaken the supervision of this project on behalf of the Parish Council.

Finally for this update, many of you will now have had your PFR measures installed in good time before the "flooding season." I am however aware that some properties are still waiting for the promised measures to be installed. We continue to engage actively with the PFR team at the Environment Agency and hope that the outstanding properties have the measures installed before the season really kicks in. I will keep you all advised.

Road safety analysis of A44 from Leominster to Pembridge.

Following requests from Eardisland and Monkland Parish councils for a 50mph speed limit along all the A44 from Leominster to Pembridge a study was done earlier this year. The results over a week showed that at a site near The Grove Farm -with the large agricultural sheds just before the turn right at Golden Cross junction towards Pembridge, there were on average 4,866 vehicles per day travelling using the A44 and A4112 to Brecon averaging over a 24 hr period 47.5 mph.

At a site on the A44 between Burton and the Stitches lanes there were 2,525 vehicles per day travelling at average 47.2 mph. The third site which is between the junctions off the A44 to Eardisland and Upper Hardwick there were 3,729 vehicles (reflecting vehicles coming through Eardisland village) travelling at 42.8 mph.

There were 14 personal injury accidents along the full section of highway over the last 5 years which is below the national average and reflects the nine sites where Herefordshire Council, have since 2004, had investment in improved signed, marking and enhanced surfacing. This includes the Golden Cross junction where the highway turns right from Leominster off the then Brecon highway. This junction was previously the most dangerous in my ward with a record of several fatalities and serious injuries.

Based on this comprehensive assessment analysing vehicle data, road geometry, roadside environment and collision data, there is minimal justification for engineering treatment or speed limit reductions at this time. However, continued monitoring of collision trends and road conditions will remain a priority for Herefordshire Council to ensure ongoing road safety along this section of the A44. If anyone would like the full report please contact me.

Drainage

Following the extended dry period we have enjoyed, it is inevitable that we will see higher rainfall periods, and I am pleased to see that our local engagement seems to have resulted in work by the Environment Agency field team, Balfour Beatty contractors and the Lugg Drainage Board. There is also further funding for the parish council to use for the parish lengthsman from Herefordshire Council. While we are all aware of the risk of flooding in the village, routine maintenance is important.

Highways

You will all be aware of the extra 10 million pounds funding that the council has put into highway surfacing this summer on our main roads, including a section of the A44 which runs through the parish. I thank residents for their tolerance of the diverted traffic during the closure times and reassure you I keep pushing for our minor road surfacing issues. It is important to report potholes as we go into the autumn period and get our highways repaired as best we can before winter.




EARDISLAND VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE - CHARITY 1108366

HIMALAYAN BALSAM

We met up at the old ford at 10am on Saturday 24th May to remove this invasive species. It was heartening to see that our work the previous year had been a success, with much less Himalayan Balsam growing this season. Himalayan Balsam is a problem because:

- It crowds out native plant species.
- It dies back in the winter leaving banks vulnerable to erosion.
- Pollinators can get distracted by it and miss our native plants.

FLOWERS OF THE ARROW EXHIBITION

WINTER APPROACHES

Now we are heading towards winter, please ensure that you are prepared. If we get a cold winter, although not so common these days, there is a danger that pipes can freeze.

You need to know where the main water stopcock is – often under the kichen sink or thereabouts. It's a good idea to run the sink cold tap, and turn off the stopcock (turn the top clockwise) – the water should stop running. Turn back on (anti-clockwise). When you reach the full on position, turn it back half-a-turn.

If you can't move the stopcock, you will need to get help from someone who knows a bit about plumbing. Likewise, these stopcocks can sometimes leak around the spindle. Again, if you don't know what to do, get someone who can make a repair.

This is important, because a frozen pipe may well leak when it thaws and you need to cut the water off to minimise the damage.

EARDISLAND NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Summer is all but over and with that the days are continuing to get shorter, nights longer, and we enter a period that historically sees an increase in the number of burglaries. As well as remaining vigilant, these steps will reduce the risk of becoming a victim: Lock all windows and doors; check that side gates, sheds and garages are locked and tools or ladders are not accessible; store all house, car and window keys out of

sight and away from doors or windows; make your home look occupied by using a timer switch to turn on lights, a radio or TV at night. If you go away, ask a neighbour to keep an eye on your home. Wheelie bins left out and parcels left outside your door could be an indication to burglars that the house is unoccupied. It can't fail to help deter burglars if we look out for our neighbours if we know they are away. Neighbourhood Watch membership provides you with access to the website and more crime prevention advice including a burglary prevention toolkit.

You can register and join the Eardisland scheme using the following link https://members.ourwatchmember.org.uk/join and select the Eardisland scheme. Members can also access discounted security equipment and home insurance, and of course your window sticker is a visible deterrent to burglars and thieves.

FROM: REV ROSIE ROBERTS

Dear friends,

As I write this, the weather is starting to change and feel distinctly autumnal. I wore tights and boots for the first time this week – and regretted it halfway through the day when the sun came out and I was sweltering! We have started to get some decent rain which will hopefully allow the land to recover after such a hot, dry summer. We're seeing the effects of the extreme weather this year with shortages of some vegetables in our greengrocers and supermarkets, and I'm sure our farmers know these effects only too well.

Our harvest festival each year is a chance to come together and sing some traditional hymns, give thanks for the land and those who work on it, and to share food and fellowship together. But much more than that, it is a chance to connect deeply with what has happened on the land and in the working lives of our farmers in the past year, to give thanks for the good but also to lament the challenges that the past year has brought – and sadly, with the effects of climate change as well as changing to farming practices, legislation and other pressures, the challenges faced in farming year on year are not insignificant. 


Can you help?

EARDISLAND WEATHER REPORT

Summer arrives at last for July in Eardisland with temperatures recorded at 18°C to 31°C, but with a continued lack of rain, only 38mm (1.49 inches). Barometer pressures were 29.4 to 30.09, the river level dropped to 10 inches.

August temperatures remained high at 16°C to 29°C. Please note temperatures are taken in the shade. There was still a lack of rain with only 23mm (0.906 inches) recorded. Barometer pressures were 29.3 to 30.01. River levels are low at 9 inches.

The equivalent rainfall for July 2024 was 65mm (2.56 inches), and August 2024, 34mm (1.33 inches).
